City Council Minutes – February 9, 2018

At 8:06 a.m. Mayor Laurie Gere called to order the advertised special Anacortes City Council meeting of February 9, 2018 in the Reid Harbor Room of Educational Service District 189 at 1601 R Avenue in Anacortes. Councilmembers Eric Johnson, Anthony Young, Ryan Walters, Brad Adams, Liz Lovelett and Matt Miller were present. Councilmember Bruce McDougall joined the meeting at 8:20 a.m. The full day retreat was facilitated by Larry Bauman of Agreement Dynamics, Inc. Planning Director Don Measamer, City Attorney Darcy Swetnam, Museum Director Bret Lunsford, Finance Director Steve Hoglund, Administrative Services Director Emily Schuh, Police Chief John Small, Public Works Director Fred Buckenmeyer, Fire Chief Richard Curtis and Parks and Recreation Director Gary Robinson participated in the meeting.

Mayor Gere reviewed the goals for the meeting: to understand each other's roles in serving the citizens, understand the needs of department heads to carry out the policies established by Council, and understand what councilmembers need from staff to make good decisions. Mr. Bauman reviewed the agenda. Councilmembers expressed no objection to the agenda. Mr. Bauman distributed discussion guidelines to maintain a constructive and cordial atmosphere. Councilmembers concurred with the guidelines.

Councilmember Round Robin Presentations

Mr. Bauman invited each councilmember to describe what motivated him or her to run for office and what he or she hoped to accomplish during the term of office. Councilmembers shared the personal and professional paths that led them to service on the Anacortes City Council and what they hoped to achieve for the community and its governance. Mr. Bauman remarked on councilmembers' commitment to serve the community and the breadth of experience represented on the Council. Mr. Bauman then invited each department head and Mayor Gere to summarize his or her professional background and goals for their service to the city.

At approximately 9:35 a.m. Mayor Gere called a brief break. At 9:45 a.m. the meeting resumed.

Governance Discussion

Mr. Bauman introduced a discussion of governance and the roles of policymakers and administrators in government. He asked councilmembers to share their views on the dividing line between policy and administration. Council and Mayor Gere engaged in extended discussion of how councilmembers and staff can serve each other in their respective roles of setting vision and policy for the city and bringing professional expertise to efficiently carrying out daily operations. Councilmembers discussed the role of committees and suggested that more regular and in depth reporting from committees to the Committee of the Whole could be useful, particularly regarding upcoming contracts and projects. Several councilmembers requested adequate contextual information and more information about potential consequences of decisions that are presented to them. Some expressed frustration that by the time a matter is presented to Council for action, there is effectively only one available course of action and that staff appears to take offense if councilmembers request more information or additional time in order to make a responsible decision. Mr. Johnson commented that funding for the Blue Heron reservoirs was a positive example of early discussion and presentation of alternatives so that Council could research and ask questions long before the matter was presented for action. Several councilmembers commented that discussion with their colleagues during a meeting sometimes prompts a new way of looking at an issue and that additional follow up time would be useful before voting. Councilmembers observed that it is also their job to monitor the effectiveness of the policies they set so they need status updates over time; Mr. Walters suggested reports from department heads as well as committees at the beginning of each meeting. Several councilmembers observed the uneven size of agendas from week to week and asked for a more even distribution of workload from meeting to meeting. Several also noted that value of study sessions and second readings to provide adequate time and consideration of large issues. Councilmembers asked that the budget impact and alternative viewpoints sections of agenda bills be more fully utilized. Chief Curtis said that staff very much appreciates receiving questions from councilmembers before a meeting so staff can assemble

additional material to bring to the discussion in a timely manner. Ms. Swetnam added that agenda bills could also provide links to past meeting packets and video so that councilmembers can review prior discussion of a topic. Councilmembers said that “track changes” versions of documents, summaries of contract change orders, and indications confirming the level of staff review on a topic are also useful. Councilmembers urged that staff not take offense at questions asked during meetings as councilmembers often request information as a means of sharing knowledge with the viewing public. Ms. Lovelett suggested that if a mistake occurs, Council and the public both need to know that it has happened and the steps that are being taken to prevent repeat occurrences. Mr. Hoglund suggested different means of communicating to Councilmembers the financial status of budgeted projects in the context of fund accounting. Mr. Buckenmeyer suggested a quarterly update to Council on public works projects, similar to the Finance update provided by Mr. Hoglund each quarter, which does include status information on each capital project.

At approximately 11:00 Mayor Gere called a two-minute break, after which the meeting resumed.

Departmental Overview

Department heads presented summaries of the services provided by their departments, current issues facing their departments, recent accomplishments, and upcoming projects and priorities. Their visual aids were added to the packet materials for the meeting. Mayor Gere reported on behalf of the library and reported that a new library director had been selected and that her appointment would come before Council for confirmation in March. Councilmembers posed questions and offered comments and suggestions on various topics that arose. Mr. Bauman observed that some topics warranted more discussion than time allowed at the retreat so he began a list of Parked topics to be revisited in another forum. The group worked through lunch for this very productive discussion.

At approximately 1:55 p.m. Mayor Gere called a short break. The meeting resumed at 2:05 p.m.

2018 Goals and Priorities

Mayor Gere distributed a copy of the budget goals developed by Council in 2015 in preparation for the 2016 budget, updated with progress to date on specific action items. She invited Council to review the list, remove what was no longer relevant, retain what is still valid, and add any new items in preparation for the 2019/2020 budget process. Councilmembers and staff worked through the list, which was updated to reflect the discussion and added to the packet materials for the meeting.

City Council Minutes – February 12, 2018

At 6:00 p.m. Mayor Laurie Gere called to order the regular Anacortes City Council meeting of February 12, 2018. Councilmembers Eric Johnson, Anthony Young, Ryan Walters, Brad Adams and Matt Miller were present. Councilmembers Liz Lovelett and Bruce McDougall were absent. The assembly joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mr. Young moved, seconded by Mr. Johnson, to excuse the absence of Ms. Lovelett who was ill. The motion carried unanimously by voice vote. Mr. McDougall's absence had been excused in advance at the regular City Council meeting on February 5, 2018.

Announcements and Committee Reports

Port/City Liaison Committee: Mr. Johnson reported from the committee meeting held February 6. He urged the public to write to their senators on behalf of Dakota Creek Industries and said that 400 jobs were at risk without Senate action very soon. He said the committee also discussed partnerships regarding the Port transit shed and a replacement event center as part of the Port's north basin plan for which a feasibility plan was due in March. Mr. Johnson also reported that work continued on the maritime strategic plan by the City, the Port and EDASC. Mr. Miller added that a joint City Council/Port Commission meeting was envisioned for April focusing on the north basin plan.

Skagit County Marine Resources Committee: No report.

Planning Committee: Mr. Walters reported from committee meeting earlier in the evening at which the members reviewed a draft impact fee ordinance that would come to Council for consideration soon. He advised that a separate impact fee schedule would follow the ordinance establishing the code text. Mr. Walters also reported that the development regulations update and critical areas ordinance update would likely be released to City Council simultaneously but that action on the two documents would be sequential, likely focusing on the development regulations first.

Public Comment

No one present wished to address the Council on any topic not already on the agenda.

OTHER BUSINESS

Contract Award: 2018 Waterline Replacement

Public Works Director Fred Buckenmeyer requested Council approval to award a contract to C. Johnson Construction, Inc. to provide all materials, equipment, labor and related items necessary to install approximately 2640 LF of 8" ductile iron water main, make tie-ins to the existing water system, install new and reconnect to existing fire hydrants, renew/reconnect existing water services, and excavate and install asphalt on Piper Circle, Sugarloaf Street and a small segment of 25th Street. He said that the project formed the 2018 portion of the city's ongoing project to replace aging water distribution piping before it reaches the point of possible failure. Mr. Buckenmeyer reported that nine bids were received with the low bid from C. Johnson in the amount of \$757,135.46. He recommended awarding the contract to C. Johnson Construction, Inc.

Mr. Buckenmeyer responded to councilmember questions about how the waterline replacement project locations are chosen each year, noting that both the condition of the utilities and the condition of the overlying pavement are considered so as to make maximum use of both utility and street maintenance funds. He confirmed that the lineal feet of pipe included in the project was not as great as in some years because the pipe size for the 2018 project would also be increased to ensure adequate future fire flow volume. He added that conduit would be placed in the utility trench to allow future installation of fiber optic cable.

Mr. Johnson moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, to authorize the Mayor to sign a contract with C. Johnson Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$757,135.46 to perform the 2018 Waterline Replacement Project 18-004-WTR-001. Vote: Ayes – Walters, Adams, Miller, Johnson and Young, Motion carried.

Contract Modification: WWTP Outfall Repair - Construction 13-020-SEW-009

Mr. Buckenmeyer continued the discussion of this item which had been removed from the Consent Agenda at the February 5, 2018 City Council meeting pending additional information. He introduced Assistant Public Works Director Matt Reynolds who managed the Outfall Repair project. Mr. Buckenmeyer noted the revised agenda bill for this item that had been distributed to councilmembers prior to the meeting. The agenda bill and Mr. Buckenmeyer's slide presentation were added to the packet materials for the meeting.

Mr. Buckenmeyer summarized the location and the function of the outfall, the history of its construction beginning in the 1950s and subsequent rehabilitation beginning in 1998. Mr. Buckenmeyer described the interaction of the Port of Anacortes stormwater detention pond and treatment of the Port's stormwater through the sanitary sewer system. He noted that the construction of the Port's pond in 2011 displaced the outfall pipe which precluded slip lining as a rehabilitation method.

Mr. Reynolds then summarized the events surrounding the current outfall repair project beginning in 2016. He recalled Council's waiver of competitive bidding in favor of engaging local contractor Culbertson Marine to work directly with design engineer Skillings Connolly due to the large number of uncertainties about subsurface conditions. Mr. Reynolds described the permitting and easement delays caused by events outside the city's control. He then described the actual subsurface conditions encountered and the construction delays caused by large rocks encountered in the path of the required cofferdam and the stop work caused by the Port's heavylift project to move refinery equipment.

Mr. Buckenmeyer summarized the project cost, including a final contract cost for Culbertson of \$1,984,371.06 compared to the design engineer's estimate of \$1,946,143. He advised that one last change order for the project would come to Council for approval, on a separate contract for the environmental consultant. He concluded by summarizing the long list of unique conditions affecting the project and noted that the total change order amount was only approximately 2% of the original contract. He added that the project had been nominated for APWA project of the year.

Councilmembers requested that agenda bills for contracts and contract modifications reflect original and any adjusted budget amounts for both the project and the relevant BARS account. Finance Director Steve Hoglund clarified that a budget amendment is not required and is typically not presented for project overruns as long as the capital project BARS has sufficient funds in the project year. He advised that other projects often achieve cost savings or schedule revisions which retain sufficient budget authority in a fund's annual capital budget. Mr. Walters asked that Council be involved in those discussions as it might elect to dedicate additional reserve cash in order to complete all budgeted projects. Mr. Johnson and Mr. Miller suggested including the Capital Facility Plan figure for each project on relevant agenda bills. Mr. Adams requested a line item breakdown of the contract similar to other public works contracts such as the waterline replacement contract awarded earlier in the meeting. Mr. Buckenmeyer explained that the sole source contracting method used for the project did not include that bid line item structure and noted that a traditional fixed price bid would have resulted in far more change orders for unforeseen conditions; in this case it was to the city's benefit to work cooperatively with the contractor on an actual cost basis. Mr. Walters asked that agenda bills for contract modifications indicate the amount that was earmarked for the project, the full BARS amount in the budget, the engineer's estimate, the original contract amount, the amendment number, the proposed resulting new contract amount, and the work changed by the modification, all in a tabular format. He added that the revenue source identified on agenda bills should always be more specific than "city funds".

Mr. Walters moved, seconded by Mr. Johnson, to authorize the mayor to sign Contract Modification 02 to Culbertson Marine Construction Inc., under Contract 13-020-SEW-009, in the amount of \$205,146.62, increasing the total contract price to \$1,984,371.06, but to amend Article 1.1 Work to read as follows:

Insert the following paragraphs under Article 1.1:

"The work as described above is hereby amended per Modification 02.

There were project conditions that were not known at the time of contract execution, resulting in differing site conditions. These include the presence of large rock over the existing pipeline which hindered the construction of the cofferdam, and the presence of holes in the existing HDPE pipe, requiring additional excavation and removal of concrete and HDPE pipe. In addition, requirements of the HPA permit, including a requirement to seine all fish out of the cofferdam, were not fully known at the time of Contract award, as the permit was issued after the Contractor bid the project.

In addition, the amount of diving hours and expenses during the project exceeded the original estimation."

Vote: Ayes – Adams, Miller, Johnson, Young and Walters. Motion carried.

There being no further business, at approximately 7:05 p.m. the Anacortes City Council meeting of February 12, 2018 was adjourned.

Background:

1. **Reason for Contract Change:** The City is planning to utilize a consultant group - PCG, through our biller - Systems Design, to assist with the cost reporting and submission of data for GEMT reimbursement.
2. **History:** Effective January 1, 2014 the City has contracted with Systems Design West, LLC to for billing services for ambulance transports performed by the Anacortes Fire Department. On 2/19/18 the City entered into an agreement with Washington State Health Care Authority to participate in the Ground Emergency Medical Transport Supplemental Reimbursement Program (GEMT) program. In order to meet the terms of that agreement and receive reimbursement the City must submit a cost report form annually, and maintain for review and audit documentation of all amounts claimed, and any other records required pursuant to the agreement.
3. **Key Terms:**
 - The fees to be paid associated with the successful generation of incremental Medicaid revenues as a result of the GEMT program are calculated based on total number of Annual Medicaid Trips. Fees are based on paid revenues per annual cost report submission and corresponding true-up, and includes enhanced incremental revenues received from the GEMT program.

**AMENDMENT TO THE PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN
SYSTEMS DESIGN WEST AND THE CITY OF ANACORTES**

This Amendment (the “Amendment”) to that certain EMS Billing and Related Professional Services entered by the City of Anacortes (“the City”) and Systems Design, as of December 1st, 2013, (the “Agreement”), is made effective as of _____.

WHEREAS, the parties agree to amend the Agreement pursuant to Section 4 to include revenue enhancement services for Ground Emergency Medical Transport (GEMT) program;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, the premises and mutual covenants contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. The parties agree that Systems Design will provide revenue enhancement services for Ground Emergency Medical Transport (GEMT) program as described in Attachment A “Contracted Services” and Attachment B “Fees.”
2. Conflict in Terms. Except as amended and/or modified by this Amendment, the Agreement is hereby ratified and confirmed and all other terms of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, unaltered and unchanged by this Amendment. Whether or not specifically amended by this Amendment, all of the terms and provisions of the Agreement are hereby amended to the extent necessary to give effect to the purpose and intent of this Amendment.
3. Authorship. The Parties agree that the terms of this Amendment result from negotiations between them. This Amendment will not be construed in favor of or against either Party by reason of authorship.
4. Severability. If any provision in this Amendment is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions in this Amendment shall continue in full force and effect.
5. Waiver. The failure of a party to enforce a provision of this Amendment shall not constitute a waiver with respect to that provision or any other provision of this Amendment.
6. Counterparts. This Amendment may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which counterparts together shall constitute the same instrument which may be sufficiently evidenced by one counterpart.
7. Authority. Each Party to this Amendment, and each individual signing on behalf of each Party, hereby represents and warrants to the other that it has full power and authority to enter into this Amendment and that its execution, delivery, and performance of this

Amendment has been fully authorized and approved, and that no further approvals or consents are required to bind such Party.

8. Entire Agreement; Non-Reliance. The Agreement, as amended by this Amendment, constitutes the entire understanding and agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes any and all prior agreements, understandings or representations with respect thereto. Neither Party is relying upon any agreement or representation by the other Party except as set forth in the Agreement, as amended by this Amendment.
9. Applicable Law, Jurisdiction, and Venue. This Amendment is to be construed, interpreted, and enforced under and in accordance with the same governing law as set forth in the Agreement, without regard to choice of law provisions. The parties consent to personal jurisdiction in that state or district's courts and that venue is appropriate.

CONTRACTED SERVICES

Pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Systems Design shall provide the following contracted services:

- Drafting application materials and responding to requests for additional information necessary for the provider to gain approval to participate in the Ground Emergency Medical Transport (GEMT) program
- Preparing a fiscal impact study and presenting results to city/department stakeholders to demonstrate benefits of the GEMT program to the provider
- Identifying eligible costs and developing appropriate cost allocation methodologies to report only allowable costs for providing emergency medical services to Medicaid and, as applicable, uninsured populations
- Developing customized web portal to assist with cost report calculation and auditing process
- Conducting analysis of the provider's financial and billing data in order to prepare and submit annual cost reports, the mechanism for providers to receive additional revenue under the GEMT program
- Providing comprehensive desk review support, including but not limited to conducting reviews of all cost settlement files, performing detailed analysis of billing reports generated by Medicaid agencies to ensure that all allowable charges and payments are encompassed in the calculation of the final settlement, and drafting letters and providing supporting documentation to meet Medicaid requirements and expedite settlement
- Conducting comparative analysis to identify significant trends in billing and financial data
- Provide ongoing audit support in the event of a state and/or federal audit of GEMT program cost report

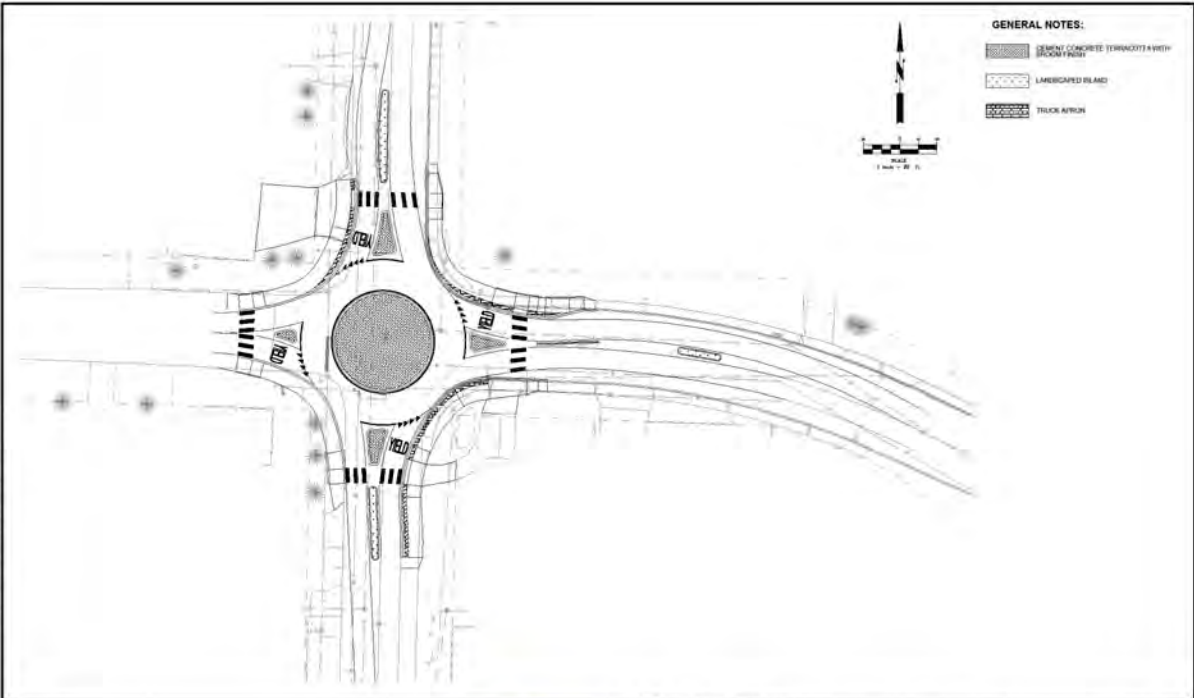

The fees to be paid associated with the successful generation of incremental Medicaid revenues as a result of the Ground Emergency Medical Transport (GEMT) program are calculated based on total number of Annual Medicaid Trips and detailed in the table below. Fees are based on paid revenues per annual cost report submission and corresponding true-up, and includes enhanced incremental revenues received from the GEMT program (Medicaid Fee for-Service and Medicaid Managed Care).

As notated in the above model, providers with more than 60 annual Medicaid Trips have the option of electing to pay the Fixed Fee Cost per Submission, or the 15% Contingency, per annual cost report submission and corresponding true-up, inclusive of enhanced incremental revenues received from GEMT program.

The fees based on revenues received from the GEMT program shall be paid in full directly to SYSTEMS DESIGN within thirty (30) days of receipt of funds by the City. **Invoicing will occur only after HCA “true-up” is completed in full.** The City will remit payment to Systems Design within thirty (30) days of invoice receipt.

Summary Statement: City staff seeks City Council consent to issue a contract modification to Transportation Solutions Inc. in the amount of \$54,525.89, increasing the total contract price to \$126,145.05, to incorporate the more complex design, larger footprint, raised curbing and impacts to driveway access that is necessary for the design of the 32nd Street/D Avenue Roundabout Project.

Background:

1. **Reason for Contract Change:** The original project concept was for a simple mini roundabout with minimal impacts to existing curbing or adjacent properties. In evaluating the existing conditions including existing vehicle speeds, truck volumes and multi-modal access, the resulting design has become more of an urban compact roundabout design with a more complex design, larger footprint, raised curbing and impacts to driveway access. As such, the level of effort required has increased.
2. **History:** The City has requested additional work to include extending the southwest sidewalk and modifications to the southwest driveway. This is additional out of scope design work involves coordination with property owners and the City, coordination for additional survey, creating design concepts, reviewing concept designs with City, actual design work for the layout, grading and drainage of access improvements including ADA driveway ramps, and incorporating the design modifications into the existing plans and estimate.

- Reason for Contract Change:** Unknown at the time of contract execution there were two unexpected requirements of the Corps of Engineers permit:
 - The permit came with a requirement of zero (fish) kill. This required the removal of all fish, including fingerlings, from the interior of the coffer dam that Culbertson Marine Construction constructed. The Consultant had to place their boat inside the coffer dam and sweep the water inside the dam with a full depth net from one end to the other, chasing all fish out of the dam before the end was closed off, resulting in an increase of materials and hours.
 - The permit also had a requirement to monitor for whales while the sheet piles were being driven. If a whale was spotted, the pile driving was to stop for a period of time until the whale left the area. This required the Consultant to be onsite 100% of the time when piles were driven or might be driven, resulting in an increase of hours.

Article 2. Price

Delete in its entirety and insert the following:

"The services provided under this Agreement shall be reimbursed on a time-and-materials (T&M) basis not-to-exceed **Ninety-Six Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars and Sixty-Four Cents (\$96,275.64)**. Summary Statement: Proposed Ordinance 3020 is a six month extension of the previously-adopted moratorium on new applications for wireless facilities and telecommunications franchises to allow time for the City to adopt new sections of the Anacortes Municipal Code.

Background: Chapters 5.36 and 17.63 of the Anacortes Municipal Code are out of date and do not provide clear enough procedures or standards for the types of telecommunications and wireless applications the City faces for antennas and for franchise agreements. City Council adopted Ordinance 3010 on August 28, 2017, which placed a six month moratorium on processing applications for new wireless facilities and franchise agreements. A public hearing was held on October 2, 2017, at which time Council adopted a work plan to complete necessary code updates. Staff are working on the steps outlined in the work plan, including working with outside counsel on the update and reaching out to the public and representatives of the telecommunications industry. An additional six months is needed to complete all steps to update the code.

An ORDINANCE EXTENDING A MORATORIUM on the receipt and processing of applications to site wireless communications towers and antennas pursuant to Chapter 17.63 of the Anacortes Municipal Code and on the receipt and processing of applications for telecommunications franchises or master permits pursuant to Chapter 5.36 of the Anacortes Municipal Code.

Whereas the Anacortes Municipal Code Chapter 17.63 provides procedural rules for the receipt and processing of applications for siting wireless communications towers and antennas; and

Whereas the Anacortes Municipal Code Chapter 5.36 provides rules for the receipt and processing of applications for telecommunications franchises or master permits; and

Whereas City staff is currently working, with the assistance of outside counsel, on a plan to rewrite all of the Anacortes Municipal Code sections relating to telecommunications facilities, including wireless communications towers and antennas and franchise agreements; and

Whereas the Anacortes City Council desires to preserve the status quo while the City completes all necessary code updates; and

Whereas City Council desires to rewrite Chapters 17.63 and 5.36 of the Anacortes Municipal Code to clarify criteria and procedural rules for wireless towers and antennas and franchise agreements prior to the expiration of this moratorium; and

Whereas RCW 35.99.050 authorizes the City to adopt a moratorium on the acceptance and processing of applications, permitting, construction, maintenance, repair, replacement, extension, operation, or use of any facilities for personal wireless services, provided such moratorium is consistent with Federal Communications Commission Guidelines Regarding Facilities Siting;

Whereas City Council adopted Ordinance 3010 on August 28, 2017, which established a six month moratorium on the receipt and processing of applications to site wireless towers and antennas and on the receipt and processing of applications for telecommunications franchises;

Whereas City Council adopted Resolution 1995 on October 2, 2017, which reaffirmed the moratorium in Ordinance 3010 and adopted a work plan for updating relevant sections of the Anacortes Municipal Code;

Whereas City staff are currently working on the action items in Resolution 1995 and need to extend the moratorium to allow adequate time to complete the work plan and update the relevant sections of the Anacortes Municipal Code;

Now, therefore, the City Council of the City of Anacortes does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Findings of fact. The City Council of the City of Anacortes makes the following findings:

- A. The above recitals are adopted as findings of fact.
- B. The City needs time to review and amend Chapters 5.36 and 17.63 of the Anacortes Municipal Code, and any other related land use regulations, to adequately address issues relating to the siting of wireless telecommunications facilities in a manner that addresses local concerns, provides the public with access to wireless services for its safety, convenience and productivity, and complies with the Telecommunications Act of 1996.
- C. This extension of the moratorium is not intended to stall or discourage in any way the placement of wireless telecommunications facilities within the City of Anacortes.
- D. The City Council of the City of Anacortes deems it necessary to prohibit the receipt and processing of new applications for siting wireless towers and antennas and telecommunication franchises until the Code is updated, as in the interest of protection of public safety and health, and in the interest of providing time to evaluate the best alternatives for the community.
- E. This action is consistent with Chapter 35.99 RCW and the Federal Communications Commission Guidelines Regarding Facilities Siting.
- F. RCW 35A.63.220 and RCW 36.70A.390 allows the City to adopt a moratorium effective up to twelve (12) months subject to a public hearing within sixty (60) days and putting a work plan in place.
- G. The City properly adopted a work plan; the extension of the moratorium for an additional six months to complete the work plan is reasonable and necessary to protect the public safety and health, and in the best interest of providing time to evaluate the best alternatives for the community.

Section 2. Moratorium.

- A. The temporary moratorium in the City of Anacortes, adopted by Ordinance 3010 is hereby extended for an additional six months, prohibiting the processing of new applications for wireless towers and antennas and new telecommunication franchises, or any other similar applications under Chapters 5.36 and 17.63 of the Anacortes Municipal Code.
- B. This ordinance does not apply to any uses legally established, permits issued, or complete applications vested, before the effective date of this ordinance.
- C. Any applications submitted during the time that this moratorium is in effect may be accepted and processed by the City, but final approval will be subject to new Code provisions currently being developed.

D. Pursuant to RCW 36.70A.106, this Ordinance will be transmitted by the Finance Director to the Washington State Department of Commerce as required by law.

E. Should any portion hereof be found unlawful, unconstitutional or in any way nullified or overturned, the remainder hereof shall remain in full force and effect.

F. Effective date and duration. The City Council hereby finds that this ordinance is necessary and proper to protect the public health and public safety. This ordinance, pursuant to RCW 35.12.130, shall be effective five days after passage by the City Council, signature by the mayor, and publication. The extended moratorium established hereby shall terminate on August 28, 2018.

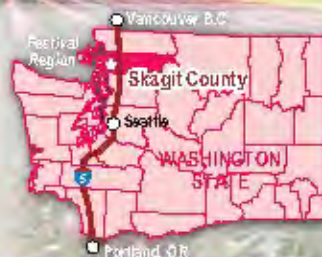

DETAILED travel DIRECTIONS

These detailed instructions should help you get from I-5 Exits to the tulip growing area. Exits 230 and 221 are recommended during peak travel times.

EXIT 230 Burlington Exit

Exit I-5 and head west on SR 20 toward Anacortes

Proceed west on SR 20 for 3 miles until you reach Best Rd/Farm To Market Rd. Turn Left on Best Rd and proceed 1.7 miles until you reach McLean Rd.

This will put you at the McLean Rd roundabout, in the center of the tulip growing area. There are numerous routes you can follow — consult the Festival map to decide.

EXIT 221 Conway Exit

Exit off Interstate 5 and head west toward LaConner

Proceed approximately 0.1 mile. Enter the roundabout and turn onto Fir Island Rd and proceed west 5.1 miles where the road curves to the left and up an incline to a bridge over the Skagit River. Cross the bridge and continue for 3.1 miles when you will arrive at the intersection of Best and Calhoun roads. *You are now at the southern edge of the tulip growing area. From here, use the Festival map to visit events and activities, find your favorite field or visit the gardens, RoozenGaarde and Tulip Town.*

EXIT 226 Mount Vernon Exit

Exit off I-5 and head west for 0.1 mile

Turn right onto S Third St for 0.3 miles, then EITHER continue onto W Division St for 0.5 miles (you will cross the Skagit River) Turn Left onto S Wall St; Wall St turns into McLean Rd in 249 feet; Continue on McLean Rd for 2.5 miles.

OR continue onto W Division St for 2.3 miles (you will cross the Skagit River) Turn Left onto Avon Allen Rd for 1.1 miles; Turn Right onto McLean Rd and proceed 1 mile to Beaver Marsh Rd.

At this point you can turn Left onto Beaver Marsh Rd and proceed 0.4 miles to RoozenGaarde. Or, you can proceed on for 1 mile and turn Right onto Bradshaw Rd and proceed 0.5 miles to Tulip Town.

As You Leave The quickest route out of the tulip field area is SR 20. Use the Festival map to locate where you are and proceed to SR 20 and east to I-5. If you decide to leave via Fir Island Rd to the south, we suggest you consider using the following route from the intersection of Fir Island Rd and Pioneer Highway: Enter the roundabout and turn onto Pioneer Highway and proceed south 2.3 miles; Turn left onto Milltown Rd and proceed east 0.9 miles. *This is the intersection of I-5 and Exit 218. From here you can proceed north or south on I-5 to your end destination.*

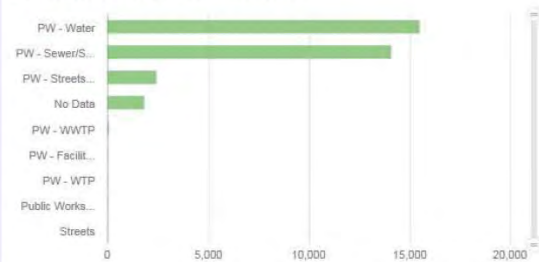

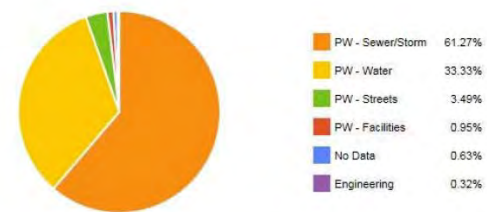
AVERAGE COST PER ACTIVITY

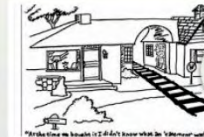

Summary Statement: City staff seeks City Council consent to award a contract in the amount of \$226,518.05 to Larry Brown Construction, Inc. to provide all materials, equipment, labor and related items necessary for the reconstruction of a portion of the downtown sidewalks that will upgrade ADA ramps and eliminate sidewalk trip hazards, with an emphasis on those caused by street tree roots. The work includes, but not limited to, saw-cutting asphalt and concrete, roadway excavation and hauling, clearing and grubbing, the construction of: sidewalks, ADA ramps, traffic curbs and gutters, pedestrian curbs, detectable warning surfaces, and other work, all in accordance with the Contract Plans, Contract Provisions, and the Standard Specifications. The project is located in downtown Anacortes, the area generally bounded by 2nd Street, 12th Street, N Avenue, and R Avenue.

Background:

1. **History:** The City has specific annual budgets for both ADA and sidewalk/trip hazards. This project is partially a follow-up to the Commercial Avenue overlay, to upgrade ADA along paving projects per FHA, and partially a general clean-up of ADA/Trip Hazard issues in the old town area. The work locations for these projects are prioritized based on pedestrian population density.

CONTRACT 17-028-TRN-004

THIS AGREEMENT, made in two (2) copies, each of which shall be deemed original, and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2018, between the City of Anacortes, Washington, a Municipal Corporation (hereinafter called OWNER) and Larry Brown Construction, Inc. a private contractor at PO Box 29960, Bellingham, WA 98228 (herein after referred to as "CONTRACTOR").

WITNESSETH:

That in consideration of the terms and conditions contained herein and attached and made a part of this agreement, the OWNER and CONTRACTOR hereto covenant and agree as follows:

I. WORK.

The Contractor shall do all work and furnish all tools, materials, equipment, and transportation required for the construction of as **Downtown Sidewalks - Phase 2** in accordance with and as described in the City of Anacortes document entitled "**Plans, Specifications, and Contract Documents – as Downtown Sidewalks - Phase 2**" which is hereby incorporated by reference and made a part hereof, and shall perform any changes to the work in accord with the Contract Documents.

II. ENGINEER.

Unless otherwise specifically stated, the word "Engineer" shall be understood to mean the OWNER'S Project Manager or the OWNER'S authorized representative who will perform the Contract Administration and field inspection responsibilities

III. CONTRACT TIMES AND LIQUIDATED DAMAGES.

Contract Times:

Unless modified by the proposal, Contract time shall begin on the first working day following the Notice to Proceed. The contract time shall commence upon issuance of Notice to Proceed. Physical Completion shall be achieved within **60 WORKING DAYS** after the Work commences, as defined in Special Provisions (1-00.5).

Liquidated Damages:

If said work is not completed within the time specified for Physical Completion, the Contractor agrees to pay the Owner the sum specified in Section 1-08.9 of the Standard Specifications for each and every working day said work remains incomplete after expiration of the specified time, as liquidated damages.

IV. CONTRACT PRICE.

The OWNER, hereby promises and agrees with the Contractor to retain and does retain the Contractor to provide the materials and to do and cause to be done the above-described work and to complete and finish the same according to the plans and specifications contained in document entitled "**Plans, Specifications, and Contract Documents – as Downtown Sidewalks - Phase 2**", and the terms and conditions herein contained, and hereby the OWNER contracts to pay CONTRACTOR for completion of the Work and in accordance to the same and the attached bid

schedule, which is included as an **Exhibit A** to this Agreement based upon the Unit Prices shown. The total contract price is **Two Hundred Twenty-Six Thousand Five Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Five Cents (\$226,518.05)**.

Interest:

Moneys not paid when due as provided in the General Conditions shall bear interest at the maximum rate allowed by law at the place of the Project.

V. CONTRACTOR REPRESENTATIONS.

In order to induce OWNER to enter in this Agreement, CONTRACTOR'S representations are as set forth as follows:

- A. CONTRACTOR has familiarized him/herself with the nature and extent of the Contract Document, scope of Work, site conditions, locality, general nature of work to be performed by OWNER or others at the site that relates to Work required by the Contract Documents and local conditions and federal, state, and local laws and Regulations that in any manner may affect cost, progress, performance, or furnishing of Work.
- B. CONTRACTOR has carefully studied and examined the supplement, referred to above, which pertain to the conditions (subsurface or physical) to or contiguous to the site which may affect cost, progress, performance, or furnishing of said Work as CONTRACTOR deems necessary for the performance and furnishing of the Work at the Contract Price, within the Contract Times, and in accordance with other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents, including specifically the provisions of the 2012 WSDOT Specifications; and no additional or supplementary examinations, investigations, explorations, tests, reports, or similar information or data are or will be required by CONTRACTOR for such purposes.
- C. CONTRACTOR has reviewed and checked information and data shown or indicated in the Contract Documents with respect to existing Underground Facilities at or contiguous to the site and has included costs as defined by WSDOT Specifications.
- D. CONTRACTOR has correlated information known to CONTRACTOR and results of such observations, familiarizations, examination, investigations, explorations, tests, and studies with Contract Documents.
- E. CONTRACTOR has given OWNER written notice of conflicts, errors, ambiguities or discrepancies that it has discovered in the Contract Documents and the written resolution thereof by OWNER is acceptable to CONTRACTOR, and the Contract Documents are generally sufficient to indicate and convey understanding of terms and conditions for performing and furnishing Work.

VI. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.

- A. Contract Documents that comprise the entire Agreement between OWNER and CONTRACTOR concerning Work are defined in the WSDOT Specifications.
- B. Exhibits to this Agreement include:
 - 1. Conformed Bid Form signed by CONTRACTOR.
 - 2. Executed Performance and Payment Bond.
 - 3. Required documents submitted by the CONTRACTOR prior to the execution of Agreement as identified in the "Instruction to Bidders".

VII. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. No assignment by a party hereto of any rights under or interests in the Contract Documents will be binding on another party hereto without the written consent of the party sought to be bound, and specifically but without limitation moneys that may become due and moneys that are due may not be assigned without such consent (except to the extent that the effect of this restriction may be limited by law), and unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment. No assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under the Contract Documents.
- B. OWNER and CONTRACTOR each binds itself, its partners, successors, assigns, and legal representatives to the other party hereto, its partners, successors, assigns, and legal representatives in respect of all covenants, agreements, and obligations contained in the Contract Documents.
- C. It is further provided that no liability shall attach to the City of Anacortes, Washington, by reason of entering into this contract, except as expressly provided herein.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Contractor has executed this instrument on the day and year first below written and the Authorized Official has caused this instrument to be executed by and in the name of the City of Anacortes the day and year first above written.

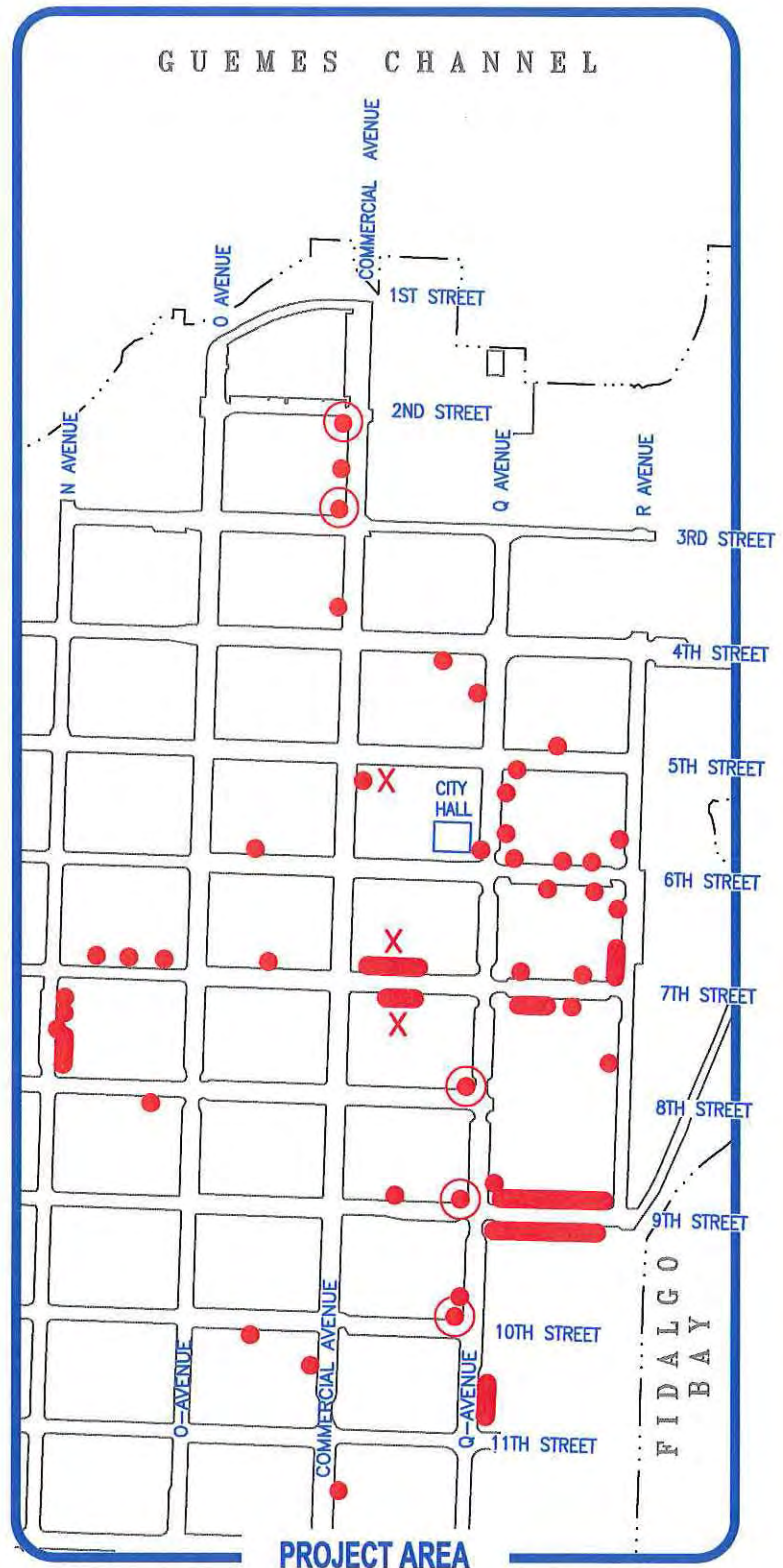
